8th Moon Cycle: Fate, Destiny, and Seeing beyond the Illusion of Finality

"She Who Heals - Shaman Healer"

In August, during the 8th Moon Cycle, we focus on Clan Mother "She Who Heals," the guardian of Serving the Truth. According to Shaman Sams, She Who Heals embodies the stewardship of the healing arts, matron of all Rites of Passage, protector of the mysteries of life & death, and chanter of the final melody, the Death song. She is closely connected to all plant spirits, and as a steward of life and death, ushers souls to and from this world. She teaches us the cycles of the great medicine wheel of life, when to resist, when to surrender, when to allow our spirits to decide, and how to embrace death as a pathway to new beginnings. She Who Heals instills in every individual the capacity to release the fear of death and embrace change as a new journey during our Earth Walk. Ultimately, she shows us how to see beyond the illusion of finality and prepares us for rebirth in the Spirit World.

Ørlög ("Fate") written in Younger Futhark, a Scandinavian runic alphabet, circa 9th century AD

Norse Shamanism speaks to Creation as having no beginning or end. Parallels can be drawn to the foundational concepts of existence embodied in Norse and Proto-Germanic terms like Ørlög and Wyrd. Ørlög (pronounced "wore-low") has typically been viewed as primal, and inflexible laws of nature that do not change over time, and to which all things are bound regardless of whether we like it or not. It has sometimes been associated as part of our legacy, passed down to us by our ancestors, a kind of genetic karma. This has traditionally been accepted as Fate.

In conjunction with Fate, we have Wyrd (pronounced "weird"), Old Norse in Origin, from Urðr (pronounced OHthur), which has been used loosely to mean Destiny. In July's article, I spoke of the never-ending nourishment of Creator's Love, referring (at one point) to the Urðarbrunnr, the well or water source that gives eternal life to the forever green Yggdrasil, the Norse "Tree of Life." This water spring in its entirety, is the totality of all potential. It is then an interesting connection that this "pool of potential" has a relationship with Destiny. Anything made here, becomes manifest in the World. Wyrd, used in the context of destiny describes how life is shaped within the predetermined framework of the Ørlög (wore-low). To the individual, it is the process of choice and evolution.

In a game of Poker, "Wyrd" would be working with the hand that has been dealt, while in Pool, or Billiards, it's assessing the table after the break, and making-due with that articulate chaos of spherical topography.

Another enjoyable connection is the Web of Wyrd and the number 9 in Numerology. The Web of Wyrd represents all the shapes that can be expressed in the Scandinavian Runes (Viking Age Alphabet) and includes the countless ways we can mold the boundless possibilities of destiny in our physical reality. In other words, we can look at Ørlög (worelow) and Wyrd (weird) as Fate and how we respond to it.



"Web of Wyrd"

Numerology is said to be the study of the spiritual and mystical significance of numbers. In its most primitive form, numerology considers the numbers 1-9. Directing your attention to the Web of Wyrd, you'll observe 9 staves or branches. The number 9 in Numerology depicts wholeness, completeness, death, and preparations for a new beginning. It is the end of a cycle, preparing for the transition into a new cycle (the number 1, Life, birth, beginnings, etc.). Whereas Urðr, the water spring of Fate (represented by the number 9) holds potentiality, Destiny manifests in the physical world (symbolized by the number 1).

So what is the difference between Fate and Destiny? A simple search online revealed that "Fate" implies a lack of control or inevitability, while "destiny" suggests a sense of purpose or direction that can be influenced by personal agency. I can't help but think of how this relates to the 5th Degree, Perfect Master.



Jewel of the 5th Degree – Perfect Master

In the 5th Degree, Perfect Master, we are no longer in deep mourning of the death of Master Hiram Abiff, but still remain in a state of sorrow. Among many of the lessons imparted, the primary instruction of this degree is based on the certainty of Death: "While we think, we die... Death is the portion of every man." In this degree, we are instructed on the importance of overcoming the fear of death, and of keeping our houses in order. "We should ask God's aid to live well, that we may die well." It has been said that there are many ways to overcome the fear of death. Some purport living a life filled with meaning and purpose, whereas others suggest living your life to the fullest, following your heart, and minimizing regret. They say at the end of your life, you're more likely to regret the things you didn't do, than the things you did.

I ask that in the month of August, you meditate on how you can work towards serving the truth, by honoring all forms of life. Make a conscious effort to be more present and in the moment with every person you engage and every action you set forth. Embrace

those you love with an overwhelming bounty of love and gratitude (as if it were your last). Find your deceased loved ones represented in nature. Speak to them.


Thank you all for your continued support and dedication. Together, we are creating a bright and promising future for the Orange County Scottish Rite.

Scottish Rite Dearborn Valley, Northern Jurisdiction

Dear Scottish Rite Brothers,

I am new to the Orange County Valley but joined the Scottish Rite in 2012 in the Dearborn Valley of Michigan. Moved to southern Cal in 2014 and became a member of the S.R. here in 2016. However, due to heart bypass surgery, Covid-19, my wife's shoulder surgery etc. etc., I have been inattentive from both my blue lodge and the Scottish Rite. I returned to my blue lodge, Orange Grove 293, about 6 months ago and recently began attending the Scottish Rite here in Orange.

If you attended the June Orange County S.R. business meeting, you heard me speak a little about my experiences in the Michigan Scottish Rite. I was asked by Venerable Master James McCallion to speak about a conversation we had a few weeks ago when I mentioned to him how the degrees were performed in Michigan. I inquired if he might be interested in visiting a Reunion of the Michigan Valley. As I was not sure of the relationship between the Northern & Southern Jurisdictions, I emailed the Secretary, Tim Marshbanks, at the Michigan Valley and ask if some of us from Orange S.R. could attend their next Reunion. He responded that they would be honored to host some of our brothers from Orange County. He said their next Reunion will be March 29, 2025, and they are scheduled to confer the 4°, 6°, 15°, 28°, 29°, & 32°. Tim also said he can have a room block setup at the Hampton just up the street as well, and to let him know if we firm anything up so he can reserve rooms.

I am excited to tell you that in the Dearborn Valley of the Northern Jurisdiction, all 29 degrees are performed live. It is possible for a newly made member to complete all 29 degrees in four years or less by attending the Reunions of neighboring Valleys. That said, many brothers will travel to far reaching Valleys to help complete their Passport.* In 2013 three other S.R. brothers and I traveled to the Valley of Marquette, Michigan, Upper Region Valley of Marquette, (the Upper Peninsula of Michigan) to attend a Reunion and partake in degrees we had not yet attended. I believe our Brothers here in the Orange County Valley would gain much by visiting our Northern Brothers and attending their reunion. It is my hope that the Southern Jurisdiction might adopt the policy of having all 29 degrees "performed" bi-annually among ourselves and the neighboring Valleys.

If you are interested in attending the Reunion in the Dearborn Valley on March 29, 2025, please inform Venerable Master James McCallion of your interest.

*Passport: Similar to a U.S. traveling passport in size, shape, and color (blue), it is a book with pages for each of the 29 Degrees to be stamped after completing a Degree. You receive your blue Passport at your first Reunion. Once you've seen all 29 degrees, you are eligible for a Gold Passport. To receive your Gold Passport, your Valley Secretary validates your passport by completing the last page in the book. The validated passport is sent to the Supreme Council, which recognizes your accomplishment and sends a certificate and Gold Passport to your Valley to be presented to you.



SHAWN Talk; Like a TED Talk, only ... Shawnier

TED Talks started 40 years ago as presentations at the now venerable TED (Technology, Entertainment, Design) conferences, a global set of conferences run by the private non-profit organization Sapling Foundation. They organized these presentations to share "ideas worth spreading" and cover many topics, usually centering on science and culture, often told through storytelling. These talks have evolved in format over time: typically they are now delivered in 18 minutes or less, and are designed to be engaging, informative, and thought-provoking. These presentations aim to inspire, educate, and provoke conversations on important and innovative ideas.

I believe the Scottish Rite stands out as one of these "important and innovative" ideas as it promotes lifelong learning, ethical leadership, and a deep sense of community. Its teachings, rooted in centuries-old traditions, emphasize virtues such as integrity, justice, and charity, which are crucial for addressing contemporary global challenges. By fostering open-mindedness, cultural preservation, and social responsibility, the Scottish Rite offers a framework for personal and societal improvement, making it a timeless beacon of wisdom and moral guidance in the modern era. Here is my SHAWN Talk breakdown:

Unveiling the Mystique of the Scottish Rite

Introduction (1 minute)

Good afternoon, everyone. Today, I invite you on a journey into a world filled with history, mystery, and profound symbolism—a world that has intrigued many and remained enigmatic to most—the world of the Scottish Rite.

The Origin and History of the Scottish Rite (3 minutes)

The Scottish Rite is an appendant body of Freemasonry, offering advanced degrees beyond the primary three of Craft or Blue Lodge Freemasonry. Like all things Masonic, the Scottish Rite's origins are somewhat murky. These degrees are divided into four distinct bodies:

Lodge of Perfection (4° - 14°): These degrees delve into moral lessons and the symbolic representation of the rebuilding of King Solomon's Temple.

Chapter of Rose Croix (15° - 18°): The degrees explore themes of faith, hope, and charity and contain significant Christian symbolism.

Council of Kadosh (19° - 30°): This segment focuses on the philosophical aspects, the struggles between good and evil, and the pursuit of truth and knowledge.

Consistory (31° - 32°): These final degrees in the Scottish Rite offer a synthesis of the previous degrees' lessons, culminating in achieving a deeper understanding and mastery of oneself.

The 33rd degree is honorary and is awarded for exceptional service to the fraternity or humanity.

The Symbolism and Teachings (4 minutes)

Freemasonry, including the Scottish Rite, is rich in symbolism and allegory. The degrees of the Scottish Rite use elaborate rituals to teach moral and ethical lessons. These rituals involve dramatic enactments, symbolic costumes, and carefully crafted scripts.

For instance, the 18th degree, Knight of the Rose Croix, explores themes of redemption and the quest for spiritual enlightenment. The degrees emphasize virtues such as integrity, humility, and the pursuit of knowledge. They encourage members to reflect on their personal development and contributions to society.

Impact on Society and Culture (3 minutes)

The Scottish Rite's influence extends beyond its current contemporary members. Many prominent figures in history, including statesmen, artists, and intellectuals, have been members of the Rite.
